## **House Analogies - Welcome and Presentation**

We all receive visitors into our home from time to time. Sometimes they will be first-time guests or people that have visited before – in any event we generally greet them and make them feel valued and accepted just as they are. How would it be if we ignored them and just spoke with our family members; leaving them to find their own way around? We value and honour them by giving them our time and often some refreshment. We show them to a seat and a conversation develops, perhaps around a topic has already been established or something new that we have in common. We listen to them.

Does the entry point to your church allow and encourage such open greeting and hospitality?

Most of us take care about how home presents to those who approach or enter. When my wife and I want to repaint inside or outside of the house we don't always agree at first. However we definitely don't settle on a bland moderate beige. We both have design skills and listen to each other before finding an agreeable and a nevertheless robust scheme. The church family to should debate and settle in love without being boring about its image. It can seek out and use people with skills in colour, presentation and engagement.

How we present the house of the church tells people a lot about us as a

church family. Do we care how we appear? When we invite people over the threshold do they receive a warm welcome? Are there facilities to provide them with refreshment? Can we sit down in comfort and talk with them, taking an interest in them and listening to them, showing that we care? We could be framing pictures of the African or Aboriginal community that we have close ties with, or a significant event in the life of the church. A piece of appropriate art or sculpture from a developing world community that your church supports could be displayed in the foyer.
